Digital Magazine Service Upgrade

For several years the Library offered the community e-Magazines through Zinio. At the end of June the service changed over to RBdigital. Patrons will need to register for the new service and download a different app (RBdigital from your app store).

The changes in service will benefit the patrons as we are now able to offer more mainstream titles to our collection and the new app should be much easier to navigate. Go to the Library webpage www.greenville-publiclibrary.org (click on e-Magazines) to access.

RBdigital features full-color digital magazines for instant desktop reading, mobile streaming, and mobile-app download. With this service, patrons can add new and back issues to personal reading libraries with no holds, no checkout periods, and no limits to the number of magazines checked out and downloaded. And with personal notifications for favorite magazines, patrons will never miss an issue.

Better Homes and Gardens, ESPN, Men's Journal, and Food Network are just a few of the popular magazine titles available from RBdigital. The new collection of magazines covers a wide range of interests and topics from Health and Wellness to a variety of Hobbies and News periodicals.

The Library also offers several databases that can also be accessed from our website using your Library card. OWL or Ohio Web Library offers a wide variety of databases within the service but are broken down into the following categories: Articles from magazines and journals, Genealogy (Ancestry Library Edition), Guides (Consumer Reports), Kids, and Reference and Encyclopedias.

OhioLINK is another wide-variety database that is academically focused. It has a Central Catalog, Research Database, Electronic Journal Center, Electronic Book Center, Music Center, Electronic Thesis and Dissertation Center, Finding Aid Repository, and Digital Resource Commons.

Weiss Financial Rating is a new offering which I will describe in full in next month's newsletter. It offers free financial strength, investment ratings, and financial tools.

Young Adult Booksale



Seed Library Donation

Wow! We just received a generous donation from the Territorial Seed Company, and we are very thankful to add 153 seed packets to the Growing Harvest Seed Library! In addition to helping to replenish the items already in the inventory, we have also received new and exhausted varieties. Some of these are the Borrettana Onion, Pam and Cinderella Pumpkins, German Winter Thyme, Cumin, and Glass Gem Corn – just to name a few.

The Territorial Seed Company began in Cottage Grove, Oregon in 1979 and changed owners in 1985; the mission continued to improve people's self-sufficiency and independence by enabling gardeners to produce an abundance of good tasting, fresh from the garden food, twelve months a year. Territorial Seed Company provides hybrid, organic, and SERO biodynamic seeds but adheres to the safe seed pledge and does not offer genetically engineered seeds.



The Growing Harvest Seed Library is appreciative of all the companies that send donations that allow us to continue to serve the community. We are also grateful to those in the community that return seed which helps us remain self-sufficient and creates seeds adapted to our environment.

Craft Beer Class on Farmhouse Ales

Farmhouse ales offer a level of variety and complexity found in few other families of beer styles. Simultaneously rustic and refined, these beer styles draw inspiration from the beers brewed by Belgian and French farm estates of the 18th and 19th centuries. Farms in those times were responsible for providing beer to sustain and refresh their seasonal field workers, and each farm's beer was different from the last. Modern farmhouse beer styles carry forward this tradition of individuality while also exploring new frontiers of flavor.




On Thursday August 3 and Thursday September 14 at 6:30 p.m. each night, the Library's Craft Beer Education Series will take a look at the long tradition of farmhouse brewing, and explore how we as a rural community are uniquely positioned to appreciate these agrarian styles. The Craft Beer Education Series is lead by myself, Certified Cicerone David Nilsen. I will guide attendees through a tasting of five beer styles, explaining the history and unique ingredients and brewing processes of each.

Film Series Features *ROCKY*

Rocky is a 1976 American sports drama film directed by John G. Avildsen and both written by and starring Sylvester Stallone. It tells the rags to riches American Dream story of Rocky Balboa, an uneducated but kind-hearted working class Italian-American boxer working as a debt collector for a loan shark in the slums of Philadelphia. Rocky starts out as a small-time club fighter, and later gets a shot at the world heavyweight championship.



The film, made on a budget of just over \$1 million and shot in 28 days, was a sleeper hit; it earned \$225 million in global box office receipts, becoming the highest-grossing film of 1976, and went on to win three Oscars, including Best Picture. The film received many positive reviews and turned Stallone into a major star. In 2006, the film was selected for preservation in the United States National Film Registry by the Library of Congress as being "culturally, historically or aesthetically significant". *Rocky* is considered to be one of the greatest sports films ever made and was ranked as the second-best in the genre, after *Raging Bull*, by the American Film Institute in 2008.
